President's Message

couple of recent letters in The Fresno
Bee upset me when the writers opposing gun controls
asserted that Jews could have saved themselves during the Holocaust if they had guns. I'll save discussion of guns for another time; I'm bothered now by
the implication that Jews went to their deaths passively. With the passage of more than 70 years, the
courage of Jews involved in hundreds of instances of revolt is being forgotten.

The Six Million and the survivors faced German military might, Nazi deception that moved disbelieving victims into ghettos and concentrate camps with the demonic signage: *Work Will Set You Free*. Plus they faced anti-Semitism and hostility from civilians who collaborated with the Nazis. In response to the writers in The Bee, I cited some of these heroic fighters in my own letter, kept brief by the newspaper's requirements.

I'm still left seething, especially since we just observed Passover, the very period when Jews conducted the most memorable uprising. Historians at the Holocaust Museum have noted that the Germans required more time to quell this Jewish revolt than it took them to conquer some European armies.

The Nazis had forced about 500,000 Jews into the over-crowded ghetto starting in 1939 and gradually deported them to the death camps, reducing the number to about 60,000 by 1942. On the first night of Passover, April 19, 1943, Germans marched into the ghetto for the final transportation of the remaining Jews. But they had to retreat in shock. With Molotov

cocktails, homemade weapons, small arms and some machine guns that had been smuggled in, the Jews carried the battle to the Germans. Ordinary people determined to fight to the last. The Germans coun-

tered with 2,000 Wehrmacht and Gestapo personnel, tanks, grenades and flame throwers to level buildings. Jews displayed flags and popped up from cellars and bunkers to kill an estimated 300 soldiers,



slowed the deportations and enabled dozens to escape. Not until May 16, after almost a month, could the Germans claim the Warsaw ghetto was destroyed.

Yad Vashem, the Israeli tribute to the Six Million, described the hopeless fight as a battle for the honor of Jews and a protest against the world's silence.

The most incredible Jewish story may have been the achievements of the Bielski brothers in the forest of the Ukraine. After the murder of their parents and two other brothers, the three remaining Bielskis created a partisan unit. Initially, they were trying to save themselves but other Jews joined them. Eventually, some 1,200 survived in a significant rescue between 1942 and 1944 that was depicted in the film "Defiance"

Tuvia Bielski, a Polish army veteran, took command and helped Jews escape from Nowogrodek, Minsk and other towns. At Iwi, over a hundred were saved just as the Germans readied to demolish the ghetto. The Bielskis fashioned an extensive partly underground community that provided medical care, food, a synagogue and schooling for the children. They also conducted sabotage raids and combatted German patrols. When the Germans launched an attack with





Syrian refugees find compassion in Fresno

We have two lovely Syrian friends seeking asylum here, anxiously awaiting for over a year for approval for their husbands. They have eight children in all: every one of them sweet, smart, and refreshingly eager to live in a country that doesn't murder its own citizens with weapons of mass destruction.

Despite gracious smiles, their faces occasionally cloud with images of homes and businesses crushed to rubble, or spared but wantonly desecrated by soldiers using walls and furniture for target practice. Memories of family members searched and beaten . . . a cousin, disintegrated by a bomb, within view of his child.

It is incomprehensible how our friends negotiate everyday life, readying children for school, struggling with English, cultivating friends, trying to call family in war zones with intermittent reception.

We listen and comfort, offering a compassionate space for tears or laughter. We visit or plan an outing, provide homework help, make art or break bread together – to sustain the belief that fleeing here was not selfish, but courageous — to save the children.

Other women in currently besieged areas also have bad choices. They are allowed to exit with their children, but must leave their men behind, vulnerable to capture or worse. Many have chosen to stay and die together.

Our relationship with our Syrian friends is characterized by perseverance, grit and a zealous love for our children. And stubborn faith that the destination can be a promised land. May we be part of the promise.

20,000 military and police, the Bielskis moved the entire operation elsewhere in the massive forest.

Resistance occurred elsewhere. At Treblinka, prisoners stole weapons, attacked the guards and 300 escaped, although only 100 survived capture. At Sobibor, prisoners killed 11 SS officers; 300 fled although only about 50 avoided death. The revolt prompted the Na-




zis to close the camp. In France, Jews - one percent of the nation – formed Armee Juive (Jewish Army) and reportedly were 25 percent of the French Resistance.

Holocaust historian Yehuda Bauer has written that given the conditions, what is surprising is not how little resistance there was, but how much.

LETTER FROM ISRAEL by Vic Rosenthal

'm writing the day after the American, British and French bombing of Bashar Assad's chemical weapons facilities. The attitude of most Israelis is that we don't really care who rules Syria, because whomever it is will likely be our bitter enemy. We do what we can, providing medical treatment for Syrians wounded in the conflict, but the last thing we need is to become

On the other hand, the war there endangers us primarily because it is a vehicle for the projection of Iranian military power close to our border. Prime Minister

Netanyahu has said – and basically everyone agrees - that Iran must not be allowed to set up bases in Syria. A few days ago Israel bombed such a base, killing several Iranian soldiers and officers.

In the south, the Israel Defense Force is dealing with "The Great March of Return," a Hamas-led demonstration of thousands of Palestinians trying to break through the border fence with the Gaza Strip. Western media coverage has been extremely biased against Israel, saying that IDF soldiers are "opening fire" on "unarmed protesters."

It sounds like men, women and children are being mowed down at random. In fact, there are strict rules for when soldiers can shoot – basically, when their lives are endangered or when Palestinians are trying to break through the fence. Almost all of those who were killed were Hamas fighters, some armed with explosives or firebombs, some trying to cut the fence or blow it up.

One can only imagine what would happen if hundreds of demonstrators – including armed terrorists – were able to cross into Israel. Far greater numbers

would be shot, Hamas would have to retaliate, and there would be war.

This week we observed Holocaust Memorial Day, yom hashoah. I was walking down the street when the 2-minute siren went off, and no matter how many times I experience it – the way pedestrians stop and stand at attention, drivers stop in the middle of the roads and stand beside their cars, the absolute silence except for the piercing siren – it is a powerful emo-

tional experience.

During those two minutes, you can't think about anything else. I think about my parents' uncles, aunts and cousins who stayed in the old country until it was too late, and the entire universe of Jewish life in Europe that was wiped out. I think about the indif-

ference of Roosevelt who could have easily ordered the bombing of tracks and death camps with no detriment to the war effort, and about the calculated evil of the British who would sooner have seen Jews go up in smoke than go to Palestine. And I remind myself that "never again" means in part that we can never again depend on any other nation to defend the Jewish people.

Next week we will observe Remembrance Day, yom hazikaron, which will also have its sirens, for the more than 25,000 Israelis that have lost their lives in Israel's wars or by terrorism. And then it will be Independence Day, yom ha'atzmaut. We purchased our flag this morning, which I will proudly install on top of the antenna on our roof. Wish me luck with that.

Builds Event Space

The Audrey Irmas Pavilion, a five story building, will attach to the 1929 historic Wilshire Temple, the oldest Jewish congregation in Los Angeles.

It will house a banquet hall, meeting and conference rooms and a rooftop garden. The building is expected to open in 2020 and will cost an estimated \$75 million, 70% of which has been raised.

Rabbi Steve Leder said, "Los Angeles deserves a modern masterpiece that brings people together in the heart of the city's most diverse neighborhood."
